Dear Attorney Fazio:

I hope this letter finds you and your clients in good health. Regarding your letter of September 27, 2004 be advised that I have not knowingly publish false and defamatory statements about Messrs. Shaikh N. Omar and Louis Alston. Although I am quite confident in the integrity of the information that came to from Omar, Alston, and witnesses having first-hand knowledge I will be happy to make adjustments to the web site of www.MAFonline.net if you can identify statements that are false or misleading. As for removing all reference of Mr. Omar and Mr. Alston from the web site be advised that I have no intentions on doing so, again other than those items that can be proven false, if any. I have been described numerous times by your clients, Shaikh N. Omar, as being a man of integrity, trustworthy, forthright and tough. It is my belief that today's society has lost many of the core values and respect that made our country, families and communities strong. Mr. Omar is acutely aware that many people are too tired, too busy, too weak or too afraid to take a position that may be unpopular. Omar is operating with the idea that despite his wrongdoings no one will make the commitment to hold him accountable. With this in mind it is my intent to post your demand letter of September 27, 2004 and this response letter on the web site as well.


The decision to publish the circumstances of Omar was done after the presentation of evidence, serious debate and deliberation by a jury of his peers to wit a number of well-known and well-respected martial arts instructors, who may also be referred to as the "committee", "panel" or "board". The members consisted of approximately 17 of 22 expected attendees with an average of 25 years of "teaching experience" in their respective arts. Many of the members have state, national and international martial arts experience and relationships with other martial arts organizations. A significant number of the members instruct and regulate a number of other black belt instructors and schools throughout the United States and other countries. The gist of the Omar/Alston issued was already a topic of discussion in the martial arts community. It does not surprise me that Mr. Omar would now attempt to deflect any negative attention he may be receiving. It is unfortunate that we were not able to resolve this situation quickly and quietly on a number of occasions leading up to the board meeting of November 2003. Omar and Alston refused to meet with the panel that had gathered specifically to address this issue. Omar knew long before that he was operating outside the boundaries and felt that if criticized it would be short-lived. However, it was a miscalculation on his part. The community learned of his acts and has voiced their disapproval.

With regards to Mr. Alston, initially, the committee viewed him as a victim. However, after failed attempts to appeal to him in the spirit of brotherhood, he has now placed himself in a category of being an

opportunist with questionable judgment. Prior to this, Alston would have been considered by the board to be a non-issue - with the idea in mind that he would not represent himself to the public as a reputable martial arts instructor under such circumstances. During and after the November 2003 meeting I engaged in discussions encouraging some members that if Omar adjusted the rank of Alston to a level commensurate with his time and training the committee would openly support the resolution.

In summary, this is a basic case of good versus evil; ethics versus unethical; morality versus immorality. I deeply regret that it has come to this. Mr. Omar was once a valued friend, fraternity brother and comrade in the martial arts. That notwithstanding, I am compelled to stand up for what is right regardless of the outcome. I sincerely hope that Shaikh N. Omar and Louis Alston will rethink their position and make adjustments for the betterment of the community. And if so, I will re-pledged my support to Mr. Omar and whenever possible ask other martial arts instructors to join in the healing process. As an attorney you know that the best defense to slander and defamation of character is the truth. Regardless of this fact, I expect Mr. Omar to try and take it to the edge with a lawsuit - more than likely paying your attorney fees using the resources of his subject, Louis Alston and the sympathy of others. I have no desire to deal with frivolous lawsuits. Nevertheless, I am prepared and willing to do so. We need not wait for the October 11, 2004 deadline. I remain,
